

IB Courses and Expectations:

Full Diploma Candidates must choose **6 IB courses**, **3** courses or no more than **4** courses of study at the Higher Level (HL) and the remainder at the Standard Level (SL). Students may complete their schedules with non-IB courses. Students who pursue the full IB Diploma must take courses from each of the six groups, or may substitute a second course from IB groups 2, or 3 in place of the Arts. Students who are non-full Diploma Candidates, may choose to participate only in Group 2, World Language (Spanish, French, or German) courses; Group 6, Arts courses (Visual or Performing) and Group 3, societies courses.

In addition to the IB course work, IBDP Candidates must complete the following three requirements:

Theory of Knowledge (TOK) is a critical thinking course that integrates the required courses.

Creativity, Action, & Service (CAS) are core learning components of the IB program which must be evident from the beginning of the Junior year to the end of the Senior year.

Extended Essay (EE) is a college level essay on an approved topic of student choice. The majority research and writing should take place during the summer between the 11th & 12th grades.
